Beer, Jennifer E., with Steif, Eileen. ***The Mediator's Handbook***. Friends Conflict Resolution Programs, New Society Publishers, 1997. A manual for learning how to do mediation.

Britain Yearly Meeting. ***Conflict in Meetings***. See Committee on Eldership and Oversight

Bush, Robert A. and Folger, Joseph. ***The Promise of Mediation: Responding to Conflict Through Empowerment and Recognition***. Jossey-Bass Publishers, 1994.

Cornelius, Stella and Faire, Shoshana. ***Everyone Can Win: How to Resolve Conflict***. Simon Schuster, London, 1989. A simple, practical introduction to conflict resolution aimed at reaching win-win solutions. Easy to read and applicable to a wide range of age and situations.

Craig, Yvonne. ***Peacemaking for Churches***. SPCK, London, UK, 1999. Peacemaking and conflict resolution explored against a Christian church background by a counselor, magistrate, and mediator.

Students Resolving Conflict: Peer Mediation in Schools. Goodyear Books, Glenview, IL, 1995. Based on many years' experience in developing and supporting school peer mediation programs for the USA.

The School Mediator's Field Guide: Prejudice, Sexual Harassment, Large Groups and Other Daily Challenges. School Mediation Associates, 1999. Offers many insights that are universally valuable.

Fisher, Roger and Brown, Scott. **Getting Together: Building a Relationship that Gets to Yes**. Business Books Ltd., London, 1989. Follows *Getting to Yes* and deals with building long-term quality relationships from working relationships.

Friends General Conference. **The Wounded Meeting**. Friends General Conference, Philadelphia, PA, 1993. Dealing with difficult behavior in Meeting for Worship; meeting the needs of the many while responding to the needs of the few.

Kriedler, William. (Four Titles)

Conflict Resolution in the Middle School: A Curriculum and Teaching Guide. Educators for Social Responsibility, 1994.

Creative Conflict Resolution. Scott, Foresman, 1984. Creative and constructive responses to conflicts occurring in K-6 classes. Over 20 techniques, worksheets, and over 200 activities and cooperative games. Elementary Perspectives; Educators for Social Responsibility

Teaching Concepts of Peace and Conflict. Educators for Social Responsibility, 1994.

Teaching Conflict Resolution Through Children's Literature. Scholastic, 1995. An easy-to-use manual for teaching Quaker values using children's literature, discussion questions, activities (preschool-2nd grade).

Lampen, John. **Mending Hurts** (1987 Swarthmore Lecture). Quaker Home Service, UK, 1987. Based on experience, it speaks of hope, healing, forgiveness, and love in action.

Leimdorfer, Tom. **Once Upon a Conflict**. Quaker Home Service, UK, 1992. A manual of conflict resolution for all ages, based on six common fairy tales.

McCarthy, Colman. ***Id Rather Teach Peace: Lessons from the School of Nonviolence***. Orbis Books, Maryknoll, NY, 2002. Covers marriage and separation issues, sexuality, ageing, youth, etc.; offers suggestions, questions for discussion, reflection, clearness meetings, huge bibliography.

Schrock-Schenk, Carolyn and Ressler, Lawrence, eds.. ***Making Peace with Conflict: Practical Skills for Conflict Transformation***. Herald Press, 1999. A guide to the basics of resolving conflict, with instructions about active listening, handling tension, power in conflicts, and resolving conflict in the family and congregations. Many treasures, particularly on learning and speaking.

Thomas, Marlin E., ed.. ***Transforming Conflict in Your Church***. Herald Press, Scottsdale, PA. May be ordered at 800-759-4447.

Wachtel, Ted. ***Real Justice: How We Can Revolutionize our Response to Wrongdoing***. The Piper's Press, 1997. Describes origins and applications of restorative justice conferencing in healing hurts for victims and offenders.

Weeks, Dudley. ***The Eight Essential Steps to Conflict Resolution***. Tarcher/Putnam, NY, 1994. A clear, scholarly study of conflict by an academic and mediator. For those who are seeking analysis of causes and range of approaches, rather than damage limitation advice or dipping in.

Cook, Jack. ***Rags of Time: A Season in Prison***. Beacon Press, Boston, MA, 1972. A powerful and eloquent prison memoir by a draft resister.

Day, Dorothy. ***The Long Loneliness***. Intro. by Daniel Berrigan. Harper and Row, NY, 1981. Autobiography.

Day, Dorothy, ***Selected Writings***. Intro. by Robert Ellsberg. Orbis Books, Maryknoll, NY, 1983. Memoir and writings by the editor and cofounder of the Catholic Worker Movement.

Dellinger, David. ***From Yale to Jail: The Life Story of a Moral Dissenter***. Pantheon Books, NY, 1993. Memoir of a major figure in the American tradition of nonviolence.

Finn, James, ed.. ***Protest, Pacifism and Politics: Some Passionate Views on War and Nonviolence***. Random House, NY, 1967. Interviews and commentary by recent activists and theorists.

Goodman, Paul. ***Drawing the Line***. Random House, NY 1974. Essays by an anarchist, poet, novelist, and educational reformer.

Matthiessen, Peter. ***Sal Si Puedes: The New American Revolution***. Random House, NY, 1969. An account of Cesar Chavez and the United Farm Workers movement.

Ackerman Peter and Duvall, Jack. ***A Force More Powerful: A Century of Non-violent Conflict***. St. Martin's Press, NY, 2000. The PBS video related to this book is an invaluable and fascinating account of campaigns around the world, from the time of Gandhi up to the present.

Brock, Peter. ***Pacifism in the United States from the Colonial Era to the First World War***. Princeton University Press, Princeton, NJ, 1968.

Brock, Peter and Young, Nigel ***Pacifism in the Twentieth Century*** Syracuse University Press, Syracuse, NY 1999. Standard, thorough and readable histories by a major scholar.

Chatfield, Charles, ed.. ***Peace Movements in America***. Schocken Books, NY, 1973. Essays on various historical periods, with the histories and strategies of the peace movements.

Cooney, Robert and Michalowski, Helen, eds.. ***The Power of the People: Active Nonviolence in the United States***. Peace Press, Inc., Culver City, CA, 1987. Readable history with outstanding photographs and biographies.

DeBenedetti, Charles (2 titles)

Origins of the Modern American Peace Movement, 1915-1929 KTO Press, Milwood, NY, 1978.

The Peace Reform Movement in American History. Indiana University Press, 1980. The best overall history of nonviolence in the U.S., 17th century to the 1980's.

DeBenedetti, Charles, with Chatfield, Charles. ***An American Ordeal: The Antiwar Movement in the Vietnam Era***. Syracuse University Press, Syracuse, NY, 1990. A comprehensive history, late 1950's to 1970's.

Grant, Joanne, ed.. ***Black Protest: History, Documents and Analyses 1819 to the Present***. Fawcett Publications, Inc., Greenwich CT, 1968. One of the first and most comprehensive collections of primary resource documents from the African-American struggle for freedom and full rights.

Lens, Sidney. ***Labor Wars: From the Molly McGuires to the Sit-downs***. Doubleday & Co., NY, 1974. A very readable account of labor struggles, violent and nonviolent, in the 19th and 20th centuries.

Lynd, Alice, and Lynd, Staughton. ***Nonviolence in America: A Documentary History***. Maryknoll, NY, 1995. Expanded, updated edition of a classic anthology of American documents on the subject; excellent introduction/history.

Mayer, Peter, ed.. ***The Pacifist Conscience: Classic Writings on Alternatives to Violent Conflict***. Holt, Rinehart and Winston, NY, 1966. Essays from various countries and traditions.

McCarthy, Colman. ***I'd Rather Teach Peace: Lessons from the School of Nonviolence***. Orbis Books, Maryknoll, NY, 2002.

Merton, Thomas, ***The Nonviolent Alternative*** (Revised Ed. ed. and introduction by Gordon Zahn). Farrar Straus, NY, 1986. His principal writings on nonviolence; explores civil rights and peace movements; excellent introduction.

Piehl, Mel. ***Breaking Bread: The Catholic Worker and the Origin of Catholic Radicalism in America***. Temple University Press, Philadelphia, PA, 1982. The best book on the American roots of the Catholic Worker movement.

Powers Roger S., and Vogeles, William B., eds.. ***Protest, Power, and Change: An Encyclopedia of Nonviolent Action from ACT-UP to Women's Suffrage***. Garland Publishing Co., NY, 1997. A classic study.

Sibley, Mulford Q.. ***The Quiet Battle: Writings on the Theory and Practice of Non-Violent Resistance***. Beacon Press, Boston, MA, 1968. A standard work of selected writings on attempts to correct injustice, world wide. A wide variety, religious and secular, from ancient Rome to the 20th century.

True, Michael. ***An Energy Field More Intense Than War: The Nonviolent Tradition and American Literature***. Syracuse University Press, Syracuse, NY, 1995. The author, a member of Worcester, MA Friends' Meeting, reminds us that literary works about nonviolence hold a significant place in our country's history. Explores Quakers from the 1680's to the 1980's among our writers on action for social change.

Weber, David R., ed. ***Civil Disobedience in America: A Documentary History***. Cornell University Press, Ithaca, NY, 1978. Thoreau's essay on civil disobedience, with similar statements and manifestos, 17th century to present.

Young, Alfred F., ed.. ***Dissent: Explorations in the History of American Radicalism***. North Illinois University Press, DeKalb, IL, 1968. Essays on resistance movements in America, 17th century to the present.

Zahn, Gordon C.. ***German Catholics in Hitler's War: A Study in Social Control***. Sheed and Ward, NY, 1962; University of Notre Dame Press, 1969.

Zinn, Howard. ***A People's History of the United States***. Harper and Row, NY, 1980. A standard history by a major historian, with emphasis on social justice.
