Dear Lucinda and Christopher,

It's very kind of you and New York Meeting to think of Belgium and Belgian Friends. As far as I know no Friends were killed or injured in the bombings, though I do know of two Friends who have friends who are still in intensive care. The nephew of the office manager at the Quaker Council for European Affairs was in the Maelbeek subway train, but escaped uninjured. We are holding the dead, the injured, the emergency services, and their friends and families in the Light. We are, like the rest of Brussels, and Belgium, still considering how we relate to our city's crowded spaces, and how to resist the fear that might change our behaviour. I have found myself very reluctant to go into the city centre for shopping or the cinema, for example, which feels wrong. We'll recover!
