Racial Listening Project organized by European American Quakers Working to End Racism Working Group. During this week at Silver Bay you will see individuals wearing a nametag that looks like this: **Racial Listening Project**: *I want to hear your story*.

These Friends are offering you the opportunity to share with them how you have been affected by racism. All conversations will be confidential and will neither be recorded nor reported. It

will simply be an opportunity for deep listening as you recount your personal journey with the issue of race in our culture. It is our hope that by this process of telling our stories to an attentive, nonjudgmental listener we will take another step toward healing, trust, and discerning what each of us is "called to do to bring about justice and reconciliation." You may say whatever you wish, but if you would like some ideas to get you started, there are six questions below that may be helpful. However, do not limit yourself to these items, or even use them at all if there is someplace else you would like to begin.

- 1. Have you ever made a racial faux pas and wished you had done something else?
- 2. When did you first become aware of differences in skin color? What was your emotional reaction?
- 3. Do you ever find yourself influenced by racial stereotypes?
- 4. Have you ever been in the minority among people of a different color? How did it feel?
- 5. Have you ever challenged people making racist jokes or acting in racist ways? How did you feel?
- 6. What do you think you can do to promote racial healing?
