Statement by Jeffrey Aaron on receipt of the plaque, which will be displayed in the offices of New York Yearly Meeting:

In 1751, the Assembly of Pennsylvania celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of the 1701 Charter of Privileges, which Quaker William Penn had granted his settlers to guarantee their liberty. To mark the occasion, the legislature ordered a great bell for the Pennsylvania State House. The inscription on it was taken by the Quaker Speaker of the Pennsylvania Assembly from Leviticus in the Bible. It reads:

"Proclaim Liberty throughout all the Land unto all the inhabitants thereof."

Today, what was known as the Great Quaker Bell is known as the Liberty Bell and the Pennsylvania State House is known as Independence Hall. That it is symbolic of freedom and liberty for all and known as a proud icon for *all* Americans is as Quakers would have wanted, for only in true freedom and true equal opportunity for all people will America find real internal peace and become the land of opportunity for all and the great example for all the world that was such an important part of the thinking and writings of the founders of our country. These goals are Quaker goals and they are the goals of the NAACP and of all other good people. We walk together toward a better America and a better world.
