Pay as Led means REGISTRATION for 2019 Summer Sessions starts SOON!

In 2019, we are making our Summer Sessions more affordable to those who need it. In the past, many have had to stretch mightily in order to be able to attend, and some have stayed away because of the cost. Pay as Led is a daring experiment that counts on many people being led to pay more in order to make our summer gathering accessible to a wider range of f/Friends.

Faith and Practice Now Available as a Talking Book!

The Committee to Revise *Faith and Practice* announces the release of the 2018 edition of *Faith and Practice* in two new formats through the Talking Books program of the National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped. For participants in the Talking Books program, there is both a downloadable version and a cartridge version that's played on a machine. The Talking Books program is a free service for people with low vision, blindness or a physical disability that prevents them from reading or holding a book. Certification by a physician, healthcare professional or librarian is required. Applications can be obtained through local libraries or online <u>here</u>.

Farmington-Scipio Friends Supply Aid to Lakota People

As part of raising awareness for their Lakota people food and clothing drive, Donna Beckwith, clerk of Farmington-Scipio Region's Ministry and Counsel, has circulated this information:

- The Lakota have 800% higher rate of diabetes than the rest of us who live in the US. This is partly because they can not grow fresh fruits or vegetables due to uranium pollution.
- The average life span of a Lakota man is 44 years.
- Their infant mortality is 33 times higher than the national average.
- Elderly die each year from hypothermia.
- The population of Wounded Knee is now less than 100 people. In the winter, they all move into one building so they can stay warm. The floors are cold. There are two 2 year old toddlers, a 12 year old girl (size 14-16), and a set of twins, in eighth grade, in addition to adult men and women.

Friends have provided money to buy propane for the aforementioned building for this winter. Friends are also sending blankets, sheets, coats, mittens, gloves, hats, and boots. Friends are also making arrangements to ship bulk supplies of food.

Quaker Fund for People Affected by the Camp Fire in Northern California

A message from James D. Anderson, Jr., clerk of Chico Friends Meeting: Quakers in Chico, California, have set up a fire fund to aid those most affected by the fire and with least access to other means of support and assistance. As the community enters this next stage of recovery, we will focus on housing assistance. We will, in particular, seek ways to assist undocumented and low income people and families rebuilding their lives. We will consult and coordinate with other local groups, research arising needs, and seek to discern best use of fund resources as conditions become clearer. Throughout this process we will rely on the "promptings of love and truth" working in us and through our corporate Quaker practices as we move to action. We are mindful of the trust and responsibility present in the funds we receive from others as we, in Penn's words, "endeavor to mend" parts of this community in need. We will regularly report on our use of this fund on our website, and revise and focus this statement of intended use as we take up specific programs of assistance. We are now excited to announce *Participating in God's Power*, a one-year program under the leadership of Angi York Crane and Christopher Sammond as its core teaching team.

Participating in God's Power is built around four interconnected themes:

- **Communion:** deepening our experience of the Divine, and staying steady in transformational connection with the Inner Teacher
- Awareness: noticing how we separate ourselves from others, from God and from parts of ourselves we don't like or of which we are not yet conscious
- **Responsiveness:** developing the spiritual muscle to instead stay trusting and connected
- Healing: letting the power of God's Presence work in us to bring wholeness and integrity

Students and teachers will gather in weekend residencies, alternating between Pennsylvania and New Hampshire locations, over a twelve-month period.
