Welcome, Friends! A message from the clerk about Fall Sessions

New, Experimental Schedule

Fall Sessions 2019 will be different from past Spring and Fall Sessions. It will take place in "our own" facilities, Powell House and Old Chatham's meeting house, and the schedule will be experimental. In order for committees to discern any important late business and bring it to the coordinating committees, which can then consider bringing it to the plenary business agenda, the new order of the schedule will enable this process to work better than it has in the past. Committee meetings will take place Saturday morning after our opening meeting for worship and until lunch. Coordinating Committee meetings will take place right after lunch, and business meetings will take place after that and in the evening, as well as the usual Sunday morning.

Business Agenda and Advance Documents

The business sessions will be full and interesting, requiring careful discernment on critical items. Many dedicated Friends have been creative and caring in their committee discernment in recent weeks and at Budget Day to address significant budget concerns, membership concerns, and divestment concerns, to find the best way forward after our successful Pay as Led experiment at Summer



Sessions. <u>Advance documents</u> will appear on the <u>Fall Sessions page</u>. They are not as early as we would hope because the business items have required careful discernment and creativity this year.

Pay as Led applies to this gathering as well. All Friends are always welcome to all gatherings. Most committee meetings, including the coordinating committees, provide an opportunity to observe and participate without any required personal commitments. Peace Witness: Turning Quaker Testimony into Action


